FOURTH LESSON Matthew 2:1-12

The wise men are led by the star to Jesus.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. FIFTH LESSON John 1:1-14

St. John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

ABOUT THIS SERVICE

The first Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols was held on Christmas Eve 1918 in Cambridge, England. It was planned by The Rev. Eric Milner-White, who at age of thirty-four had just been appointed Dean of King's College, Cambridge. His service as an army chaplain during World War I convinced him that the Church of England needed more imaginative worship. He would later go on to devise the College's Advent Carol Service in 1934 and was a liturgical pioneer and authority during his twenty-two years as Dean of York.

A revision of the order of the Lessons and Carols service was made in 1919, involving rearrangement of the lessons, and from that date the service has always begun with the hymn 'Once in royal David's city.' In almost every year the choice of carols has varied, and some new ones have been introduced by successive Directors of Music. The backbone of the service, the lessons and the prayers, has remained virtually unchanged, moving deliberately through the season of Advent into Christmas. The original service was adapted from an Order drawn up by E.W. Benson, later Archbishop of Canterbury, for use in the wooden shed that was Truro Cathedral on Christmas Eve 1880.

In the early 1930s, the BBC began broadcasting the service on overseas programs. It is estimated that there were and still are millions of listeners worldwide, including those to Radio Four in the UK. In recent years, King's College broadcasts a recording of the service on Christmas Day, and a shorter service is filmed separately for television. Recordings have also served to spread its fame. In these and other ways, the service has become public property.
